Cookery Corner - Margarets' English Cherry Cake

Ingredients:

200g Red or natural glacé cherries
275g Self-raising flour
75g Ground almonds
2 Level teaspoons baking powder
225g Softened butter
225g Caster sugar
4 Large eggs

1. Pre-heat the oven to 160°C / Fan 140°C / Gas 3. Grease a 20cm deep round cake tin then line with baking parchment.
2. Cut the cherries into quarters, put in a sieve and rinse under running water. Drain well then dry thoroughly on kitchen paper.
3. Measure all the remaining ingredients into a large bowl and beat for 1 minute to mix thoroughly. Lightly fold in the cherries. Turn into the prepared tin and level the surface.
4. Bake in the pre-heated oven for 1¹/₄ - 1¹/₂ hours or until a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin for 10 minutes then turn out, peel off the parchment and finish cooling on a wire rack.

***** Please note - latecomers *****

Over a number of years now the club has had a problem with competitors not being ready for their allotted start times. This causes a number of problems. The judges and stewards are out in all weathers waiting for you, they have given up their free time to be there for you. Sometimes when more than one test is being driven the judge has to jump from one test to another. This is basically rude to the judge and can result in an inconsistency in judging. Competitors who have planned their competition, have put-to and will be warming up, suddenly to be asked to cut short their warm up and go straight in, whilst the person who is late ends up having plenty of time to warm up. This is unfair and to other drivers and could be considered a form of cheating. Where there is a problem please tell the organisers so that we can let everyone know they will be moved forward in start times.

15 penalty points will be added to your score if you are late. Many of the venues we use have a time limit for us to leave. Waiting 5 minutes repeatedly for various competitors adds up and we will have to say sorry no-go if we are out of time. Please would all competitors check the notice board on a regular basis during the day to see if a withdrawal has moved your start time forward. We will announce if the dressage is running early as you are all used to this when competing in ICD events. None of us want to be hanging around in bad weather so please help us to make events run smoothly.
